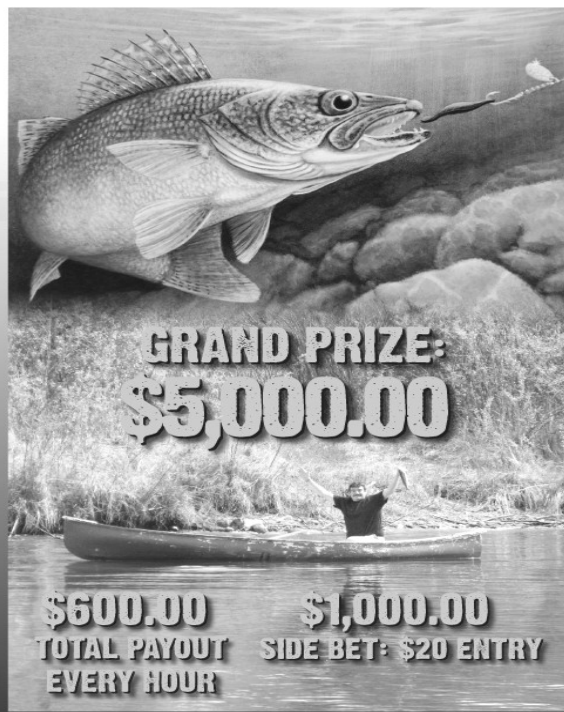

2014 CIPI WALLEYE FISH DERBY RULES

Listen to 96.5FM for Regular Updates/announcements

1. Entry fee must be paid before angling (Non-refundable)
2. Registration fees will only be accepted in cash, money orders or certified cheques. NO PERSONAL CHEQUES WILL BE ACCEPTED. Please make sure money orders or certified cheque is payable to Sipisishk Communications Inc.
3. Fish Caught in that hour will be entered ONLY in that hour.
4. Prize money guaranteed - Heaviest Walleye wins Grand Prize.
5. In the event of a tie, first weighed fish wins - All winning fish may be subjected to inspection.
6. Entry Deadline is Saturday, June 21st, 2014 @ 3pm.
7. Fishing location is on the Beaver River by Beauval. (Area will be marked)
8. Fish must be alive when weighing
9. Everyone in the boat must be registered (No passengers). If anyone is caught with passengers not registered, everyone on that boat will be disqualified. Children under the age of 8 years old can ride with parents but cannot fish.
10. Security and derby officials will be on site to monitor the fishing area.
11. Visitors and spectators will have a designated area and they are not allowed to enter the fish derby.
12. Failure to comply with any rules will result in disqualification and will be asked to leave the fishing area without a refund.
13. Tournament officials and organizers are not allowed to register for fish derby.
14. Have fun
15. A non-refundable protest fee of \$100.00 must accompany all protests.
16. Fishing Derby Committee decision is final.
17. The sponsor/committee/volunteers are not responsible for any liability arising from the participation of the derby.
18. Each entrant upon purchasing an entry in the derby is in effect waiving and possibilities of claim against the derby.

Troubling ATV Statistics Emerging in Saskatchewan

Too many people in Saskatchewan are being hospitalized every year from all-terrain vehicle (ATV) related injuries.



According to the latest Saskatchewan Ministry of Health statistics, between 2008-09 and 2012-13, Saskatchewan residents have been hospitalized over 900 times both in and outside of the province, including 220 hospitalizations of patients under the age of 16. Of the 167 hospitalizations last year alone, the most common injuries involved the head (26), shoulder (24), leg/knee (15), internal organs (12), spine (11), chest (10), hip (9) and ankle/foot (5).

Unfortunately, these numbers are likely lower than the actual figure as they don’t include patients who were treated by a doctor, walk-in clinic or Emergency Room Department but not admitted to the hospital, nor those that did not require medical attention.

“ATVs are a fun and useful farm and recreational vehicle, but there are risks to using them as well,” says John Meed, General Manager of the Saskatchewan All-Terrain Vehicle Association (SATVA), the organization that requested the Ministry’s statistics. “SATVA promotes the safe and responsible use of ATV’s in the province. We’re just encouraging everyone to exercise caution, not to drink and ride, and to always wear protective gear, such as helmets and goggles, when

riding an ATV.”

SATVA recently launched an ATV Helmet Safety Campaign to encourage more riders to wear a helmet. Properly fitted helmets can reduce a person’s risk of death by 42 per cent and of suffering a head injury by 64 per cent when riding an ATV.

As well as being lifesavers, helmets also help riders hear better as they reduce ambient wind noise, decrease distractions that occur from insects and tree branches hitting riders’ faces, and reduce wind fatigue that helps keep riders alert for longer periods of time. Brightly-colored helmets also increase riders’ visibility, making it easier for other off-roaders to see one another and prevent collisions from occurring.

“We want everyone to enjoy a great, safe riding season,” says Meed. “Please wear a helmet, ride smart and don’t become another ATV statistic.” For more information, contact John Meed at (306) 541-8427 (cell) or email info@satva.ca.

The following is a reprint of an article found in the 1954 Beauval Indian Residential School Yearbook. It was about a trip in September of 1953 to Meadow Lake, written by Flora George (now Flora Sankey). Thank you to Keewatin-The Pas Archives.

My Acquaintance with Meadow Lake Town

Last Fall in September, Pelagie Iron and I had a trip to Meadow Lake with Sr. Cyre, she wanted to reward us for helping her with the year book last year. Pelagie and I left at 10 o'clock in the morning for Meadow Lake with Father Landry in the truck. On our way to Green Lake, we stopped near the river to have our lunch. We had nice sandwiches, cookies and some soft drinks. We stayed there for a while, because it was so pleasant. At four o'clock we arrived at Green Lake and left Reverend Fr. Moraud who was with us there On the way to Meadow Lake, we saw some bulldozers making the new roads, and buses, for the first time. We passed many farms and we arrived at Meadow Lake before supper. We stopped at Fathers' house and we came in, a lady was preparing supper for the Fathers. After supper Father Landry came in our little room and gave us two dollars each to go to the show if we wanted to. But rather than go alone, we went to Benediction to pray.

After Benediction at 8p.m. the three Sisters arrived with Mr. Eugene Burnouf in the jeep. Sr A. Cyre was with them too, we were very glad to see them, because we felt more at home with them.

The next morning when I woke up, I didn't know where I was sleeping, then I remembered that I was not in Beauval. We got up and we changed our clothes that Sister Chartier had given us. That morning, how we were anxious to go to town with Sister Cyre. She showed us many places in town. The first place we went to was the drug store to buy some sweets. Pelagie and I wanted to go to Pearson's Store but it was closed, cause it was Thursday. It was interesting to visit the Printing Shop, then we went to the hospital with Sister. One Nurse made us visit some patients and when we went in the nursery, we saw four new-born babies. We found them very cute. After visiting the hospital, we went back to Fathers' house to have our dinner. In the afternoon Rev. Father St. Pierre went in his car with us to Mr. Baer's place while the Sisters went to the Convention. We stayed there about three hours. Leona Baer's sister Alma, gave us some lunch and we had fun altogether. Leona and Rita were very glad to spend that after noon with us. That night at 7:00p.m. Rev. Father Landry and Mr. Gervais came to the show

with us. The show was "Cruising Down the River". The next morning on Friday, we went shopping again alone, cause we had learned the places by then. We went to Pearson's Store and we bought ourselves nice things. I had brought my camera with me, so we took some photos in town. In the afternoon, the Sisters were going back to the Convention, and we wanted to go along with them. We visited the little day school.

We did not know that we were going back to Beauval so soon. We were sorry to leave Meadow Lake, cause we liked the place very much and there were so many more things to see and do. We dressed up and went to town again with Sister, in Miss Stooke's car. We left Meadow Lake at 6 o'clock for Beauval. In the Jeep, I sat near Sister Cyre and finally fell asleep, and I don't know what happened after this. I woke up when we arrived at the ferry in Beauval. We were home at last at 3 o'clock in the morning.

We thank Sr. Cyre, for our nice trip to Meadow Lake and we hope she will bring us an-other place again next year, but we like Meadow Lake best to visit.
