

May is National Aboriginal Hepatitis C Awareness Month



The Canadian Aboriginal AIDS Network, Pauktuutit Inuit Women of Canada and Hepatitis Services, BC Centre for Disease Control are partnering on the National Aboriginal Hepatitis C Awareness Campaign having agreed upon a mutual desire to work together to recognize the diversity and rights of Aboriginal Peoples regardless of residency, including the rights of Aboriginal Peoples to access and benefit from hepatitis C (HCV) prevention education and awareness, as well as related care, treatment and support to maintain a quality of life in a culturally appropriate manner.

In that spirit, these partners are working together to launch the National Aboriginal Hepatitis C Awareness Campaign and a month of activities will be held during the month of May. Four major cities; Vancouver, Regina, Toronto and Halifax have been identified to carry out these activities.

Hepatitis C is a major concern amongst Aboriginal people in Canada. Poor health, poverty, low education, limited housing, high unemployment, and sanitation problems are important factors that promote the spread of hepatitis C infections among Aboriginal peoples. Factors that increase the risk of hepatitis C infections include the regular use of injection drugs and involvement in other high-risk activities at an early age. Aboriginal prisoners in Canada's jails may be at greater risk due to the high rates of infection among this population. As well, researchers have identified the previous widespread use of non-disposable medical equipment as a potential cause for hepatitis C infections among Inuit.

Researchers believe that infection rates for hepatitis C are higher among Inuit and First Nations (1% to 18%) compared to other the Canadians (0.5% to 2%). Research also suggests that the pattern of infections and the various factors that place Aboriginal people at risk are different from other Canadians and therefore hepatitis C prevention education and health promotion should be different as well.

This is the first year of the annual national campaign to take place and it is planned that the more communities learn about this virus the better they will be able to protect themselves and those they love.

Defensive duo dominant taken from the Brandon Sun May 5th, 2015

Eric Roy and Colton Waltz have played a lot of hockey together this season, none better than right now.

The Brandon defence partners were superb as the Wheat Kings finished off the Calgary Hitmen in the Western Hockey League's Eastern Conference final last week to earn a spot in the Ed Chynoweth Cup championship series. In the final two games of the Calgary series — both Brandon victories — Roy had a goal, two assists and an incredible plus-minus of plus-8, while Waltz had an empty-net goal and two assists and was plus-7.

Heading into Game 1 of the league final with the Kelowna Rockets on Friday at Westman Place, Roy tops the entire WHL at plus-15 in 15 playoff games, while contributing three goals and 10 assists. Waltz, the more defensively oriented of the two, has a goal and three helpers to go along with a plus-12 rating that's tied for third in the league.

"I think they've been a really good pair," Wheat Kings head coach and general manager Kelly McCrimmon said. "They're more than capable of playing against the other teams' best line. They're different in that Waltz is really physical, a hard-nosed good defender, (while) Eric is really skilled offensively, but I think together they make each other better. ... You can tell by the situations we use them in that we've got a lot of confidence in what they've added to our team."

Waltz, who turned 20 in January, agrees that the pair complement each other well and he believes communication is the key to their



success. A hard-hitting, six-foot-one, 198-pounder from Vermilion, Alta., Waltz has revelled in the heat of the playoffs, where the skill and intensity of opponents magnifies the importance of every shift.

"I think that's kind of where my game comes out," said Waltz, who played all 72 regular-season games, posting five goals, 27 assists, a plus-39 plus-minus and a team-high 89 penalty minutes.

"I'm a guy that's just going to play for every inch out there and I think that's what playoffs is all about.

"Whoever you're playing out there, I think Roysy and I have done a great job of just making the simple play most of the time and staying out of trouble, and that's really helped us be on the plus side of things."

The 6-foot-3, 208-pound Roy had five goals, 40 assists and was plus-31 in 66 regular-season games. The 20-year-old from Beauval, Sask., is in his final WHL season and he's looking forward to the challenge of facing the Rockets' dynamic forwards.

"There's a lot of elite players now, especially against Kelowna, they have a really good squad," said Roy, whose team finished first overall in the WHL with 114 points in the regular season, two more than the Rockets.

"We've just got to go out there and play our game and try to limit our turnovers, but just go out there and have fun. It's been a long season, but we're here to play for a cup."
