LOCAL RESIDENT, KIM STEWART, HONORED FOR HER CONTRIBUTION TO THE SAFETY OF OUR COMMUNITY MEMBERS

On Monday, May 14th, a long time member of our community was recognized for her generous contribution to our safety. Twenty years ago, high school teacher Kimbley Stewart lost her husband, Tony, in a head-on collision on the Canoe Lake Road. He was trapped, conscious in the small car for 8 hours because Beauval did not have a "Jaws of Life", and the nearest available equipment brought to the scene malfunctioned.. We cannot say whether or not Tony would have survived the accident had the Jaws been available but we do know that during the hours he waited, he was slowly losing blood internally from a punctured artery. After finally being freed from the wreckage later that day, Tony passed away on his way to the hospital.

In the midst of this great personal tragedy, Kim responded by choosing to purchase a "Jaws of Life" for our local EMS. Today she was presented with a dozen roses and a card of gratitude signed by our community organizations.

In fond memory of Tony, and in celebration of you Kim, Thank You from the bottom of our hearts.

Beauval Community Report

Training

We have seen a wealth of training opportunities come to Beauval in the last little bit – thank you to everyone involved in making that possible. The Hospitality Training will be concluding at the end of June but we will see the students start doing their practicum soon in the gymnasium. Can’t wait to try their excellent food and see them busy learning – but mostly the food! There will be an ABE Level 3 course starting in the fall – deadline to apply is in June. Be sure to see Marina at GDI regarding this program.

Community Hall

The community hall will be undergoing renovations once the training programs that are being hosted in there have concluded. Once completed – the hall will serve as a programming and recreation center. Be on the lookout for the schedule once that’s complete! It will include programming for people of all ages.

Beauval Recreation Grounds

Some major renovations will be taking place to the ball diamonds – some will be completed this year and the rest will be completed next year. Portapotties have been purchased now and will be utilized at the grounds. A beach volleyball court is in the making and hope to add a tournament to the line-up at this year’s Road to the Beautiful Valley Summer Festival. We will also be re-doing the horse shoe pits. We will also be ordering more bear-proof garbage containers similar to the one next to the woody.

Landfill Closure

This critical piece of information requires an entire section on its own but unfortunately we don’t have all the information we need to make an informed decision quite yet. We do know the community landfill has reached its end of life and will soon need to be closed and contained indefinitely. The recycling program will continue and we will see curbside bins assigned and delivered to households in the very near future. We will be having a community supper to educate people on what household products can be recycled and how

to properly recycle. It is very important not to contaminate the recycling bins otherwise the recyclable materials will be labeled as contaminated and become waste. It gets delivered to the landfill in Meadow Lake and we will subsequently be billed for it.

One option being considered is also having curbside waste pickup. This system will require a lot of discipline on our part to space out our waste and continue to recycle as much as we can as your waste would only be picked up bi-weekly. We are considering though that this may not fit everyone’s existing lifestyle and it may lead to illegal dumping on our beautiful trails – something that is already taking place because of the locked gates at the landfill. We are hoping to find a happy balance for our waste management needs. We are also hoping to implement more waste reduction tactics by looking at options in community composting, plastic reduction partnership with the local stores, among other initiatives. This will definitely be a topic of discussion at a future BRIC meeting.

We will be planning this some time in June , keep an eye out for the advertisements as we would like to send well wishes to a few key people leaving the community including the Elzingas, Fr Eugene Whyte, and some teachers and community members who are moving away! Let’s get together and thank them for their contributions to our community while they lived here and hope it’s not the last time we see them around town! We would also like to take some time to recognize the awesome volunteer work a lot of people put into the community – if you would like to put someone’s name forward to be recognized, be sure to drop it off at the Village Office with some kind words we can read at the appreciation night. There’s much more to report on but I feel like I’ve said enough for the time being. Thank you!

KEY TAGS MAILED OUT AS WAR AMPS MARKS 100TH ANNIVERSARY

May 14, 2018 – The War Amps begins its 2018 key tag mailing to Saskatchewan households this week with the theme, “Still Much to Do,” as the Association celebrates its 100th anniversary.

Amputee veterans returning from the First World War started The War Amps in 1918 to assist each other in adapting to their new reality as amputees. They then welcomed amputee veterans following the Second World War and established the Key Tag Service to gain meaningful employment and provide a service to the public. The War Amps innovative programs have grown over the past 100 years from assisting war amputees – whom they still serve – to all amputees, including children. But there is “Still Much to Do” to ensure amputees have the artificial limbs they need to lead independent and active lives.

Rob Larman, Director of The War Amps PLAYSAFE/DRIVESAFE Program, wrote the letter which accompanies this year’s key tags. He lost his right leg at the age of 14 after friends dared him to jump onto a moving train. A member of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP)

Program, he later started work at the Key Tag Service, where war amputee veterans continued to provide advice and support on living with amputation. He says, “It moves me greatly to think of how these remarkable First and Second World War ‘amps’ enabled me to overcome my amputation, and I have been proud to, in turn, help the younger amputees who have come after me.”

The Key Tag Service continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys since its inception. Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants. With the public’s continued support of the Key Tag Service, the Association’s programs for amputees will carry on long into the future.

Those who do not receive their key tags in the mail can order them at waramps.ca or call toll-free 1-800-250-3030.
