TOUGHTER LAWS FOR IMPAIRED DRIVERS & **CELL PHONE USERS - Effective January 1st, 2017**

SGI is reminding Saskatchewan residents that impaired driving laws are changing in the new year. Tougher legislation was passed earlier this fall, with strengthened laws taking effect January 1, 2017.

"These changes reinforce that driving when you've been drinking is the wrong decision," Minister responsible for SGI Joe Hargrave said. "Tougher consequences around vehicle seizures, licence suspensions and mandatory ignition interlock drive home the point that you risk not only your life but the lives of everyone else on the road when you choose to drive impaired. Don't risk it. Make a New Year's resolution to plan a sober ride – every time – so you and others get home safely."

Changes build on laws implemented in 2014 to strengthen impaired driving legislation in Saskatchewan. Starting January 1:

- Experienced drivers who are charged for the first time with having a blood alcohol content (BAC) over .04 will have their vehicle seized for three days;
- There will be zero tolerance for drugs and alcohol for all drivers 21 and under and all new drivers: and
- Ignition interlock laws will be the strongest in Canada, with mandatory ignition interlock for drivers who register a BAC of .16 or greater or refuse to provide a breath sample (1st offence - two years; 2nd offence - five years; 3rd and subsequent offence - 10 years).

'New laws take effect at 12:01 a.m. on January 1st", Hargrave said, "If you're 21 or under or a new driver, remember that zero tolerance means you can't consume any alcohol or drugs before driving."

Residents are reminded they can report suspected impaired drivers to police by calling 9-1-1. In 2015 in Saskatchewan, there were nearly 1,200 impaired driving collisions, killing 54 people and injuring 580 others.

A new cellphone law is also in effect January 1st. To help prevent distracted driving, the cellphone law is expanding from "using" a cellphone while driving to "holding, viewing, using or manipulating" a cellphone while driving. The following applies under both the current and new cellphone law:

- All drivers are prohibited from using hand-held cellphones.
- Experienced drivers can use hands-free devices, but new drivers can't.
- If the cellphone is mounted on the dash, clipped to the visor or in a cradle, it's considered hands-free and it's OK for an experienced driver to use it, provided they can access the phone with one touch of a button or voice commands.



Change Will Reduce Administration While Improving Co-ordination of Health Services

Today, Health Minister Jim Reiter accepted all of the recommendations of the Saskatchewan Advisory Panel on Health System Structure, and announced the province will consolidate the 12 existing Regional Health Authorities (RHAs) into one single Provincial Health Authority.

"One Provincial Health Authority that is focused on better co-ordination of health services across the province will improve the quality of care patients receive," Reiter said. "It will also reduce administration and duplication across the health system.

"This change represents a consolidation of administration, not a centralization of services. Our government remains committed to providing high-quality health services in every part of the province. Our goal is better co-ordination between the health services provided in different areas of the province."

Along with the recommendation to move to a single Provincial Health Authority, the Advisory Panel recommends the appointment of a single Board of Directors to govern the new Authority. The report also recommends systemwide improvements that include consolidation of health system administrative support functions and some clinical services such as laboratory and diagnostic imaging, and the planning, dispatch and delivery of Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

"We recognize the changes we are recommending are significant," Advisory Panel member Dr. Dennis Kendel said. "The Advisory Panel encourages the provincial government and senior leaders within the health system to take the time required to ensure a smooth transition."

This is a significant change, and it will take time to create a new Provincial Health Authority. Work on implementation planning has already begun at the Ministry of Health. A comprehensive plan is being developed that will work through critical implementation details, including legislation, governance, financial and change management considerations. While the date the new Provincial Health Authority will come into being is still to be determined, it is anticipated to occur in fall 2017.

"We want to do this quickly, but it is important to do this right," Reiter said. "The priority will be planning for a smooth transition and ensuring patients are always the focus. Throughout the transition to the new Provincial Health Authority, our number one goal will be to ensure patients receive the same or better care.

"I thank the Advisory Panel for its thoughtful report," Reiter said. "I am confident that implementing these recommendations will result in the most effective and efficient health care structure for Saskatchewan."

Recreation Director's Report - Wayne Laliberte

The Recreation Center has been fairly active for the purchase volleyball equipment for the new past few months. The hours are: Monday to Friday (4 to 9pm), Saturdays (1 to 9pm) and Sundays (closed). Funding is needed to purchase items such as board games and snacks for the youth. Additional programs are also being considered. The Recreation Center worker is Jonah Bird.

The outdoor rink has yet to be constructed. Unsure of the reasoning of dismantling it from the previous location. Community members have been utilizing the pond for skating. Safety is being promoted.

Minor Hockey has had a zero interest in terms of children signing up for this years Highway 155 League. Equipment is a barrier for some kids along with funds for the registration costs. I do have the capabilities to assist parents with funding applications if required. We have to reboot our Minor Hockey Program.

Recreation has been approved a grant of \$5000 to be used for ice fishing lessons along with trapping lessons administered by three of our local trappers. hunters and fishers. Schedule to be set very soon. Program will run until March.

The Alcohol and Drug Free New Year's Eve Party was a success. Thanks to everyone that volunteered their time towards this event. Cameco donated \$2000. Money that was to be used for a hockey school that was cancelled by Canoe Lake, but with Cameco's permission I was able to redirect their donation to a sober New Year's celebration. A follow-up was also submitted to Cameco.

Here are some of the other programs I am currently working on: Fiddling, Ball Hockey, Broomball, Volleyball, Basketball, Badminton & Archery.

A \$400 grant has been awarded to Beauval Recreation from Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation to start a ball hockey program . I will buy hockey sticks with this money.

A grant of \$3170 was awarded to Beauval Recreation from Aboriginal Sport Development to

Community Gym. I will have that equipment in place prior to a volleyball tourney on January 21st.

A grant of \$4500 from Cameco Creative Kids Cultural Grant was given for a Fiddling Program. However, after purchasing the fiddles at a cost of \$1900, the initial instructor was not available. Adam Daigneault will now assume the responsibility of instructor and will start his first set on January 28th for ages 8 to 12 boys & girls.

Once the new gymnasium is fully operational for use, Beauval Recreation will design a monthly calendar of events and activities which will cater to all age groups. We will also work towards the improvement of the Sports Grounds so Beauval can enjoy a hub of activities which would include slopitch, bolo, horseshoes, outdoor volleyball, golf driving range, and other things.

Successful organized sporting activities require certified coaches along with certified officials and community volunteers. I will continue to assist interested individuals through this process. We require volunteerism to make things happen!

Sometimes people have to create their own recreation. It's not always about competitive organized sporting activities. Recreation could include: going for a walk, reading a book, going skiing, sliding or skating, going ski-doing or quadding, snaring rabbits, visiting, playing cards, etc. Beauval Recreation encourages the formation of groups that promote recreation. For example: a photography club, men's & ladies fun clubs, curling club, skiing club, youth groups and so on. In cases like this, the Recreation Director can assist with applying for grants to successfully implement these types of groups.
